3. FUNDING APPLICATIONS

Horton Housing

Nickie Lamb, Manager Horton Housing Association informed the Board that funding had previously been awarded by the Southern CEF to Horton Housing to part fund the provision of a play area on the site in Burn. She explained that it had proved difficult to obtain planning permission for the play area, and due to these difficulties she requested that the funding be transferred to provide a community facility on the same site. The facility would take the form of a static caravan / mobile home located on the site, which would be adapted to provide a drop-in area, a children's corner and an office area.

The Sub-Committee members felt that given the proposal was for a new project, a new application should be submitted that provided full details.

The Sub-Committee agreed to recommend to the Partnership Board that Horton Housing be asked to submit a new application.

Positive Youth CIC

Charlee Bewsher, Director Positive Youth CIC, informed the Sub-Committee that the application was for £1000.00 to expand the work of a Bike Library project, purchase cycle helmets and to enable the organisation to work with groups of young people to provide them with the opportunity to develop skills and knowledge in bicycle maintenance and personal road safety.

2. MINUTES

The Partnership Board considered the minutes of the Southern CEF Partnership Board and Funding Sub-Committee held on 14 January 2016. Steve Laurenson stated that he had sent his apologies for the Partnership Board and Funding Sub-Committee but they had not been recorded in the minutes.

With regards to the minutes of the Southern CEF Forum meeting held on 17 March 2016, the Chair requested that Paul Jones (Shire Group of Internal

Drainage Boards) be included in the list of consultation tables present. Steve Laurenson stated that he had not been present at the Forum meeting and therefore his name should be deleted from the attendance list.

RESOLVED:

3. FEEDBACK FROM THE RECENT COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT FORUM

The Chair reported that the last Community Engagement Forum had been held on Thursday 17 March 2016 at Eggborough Sports and Social Club, Eggborough. The focus of the meeting had been flood mitigation.

Representatives from Emergency Planning, North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC), Environment Agency, the Shire Group of Internal Drainage Boards and Environmental Health, Selby District Council had been in attendance.

The Board was informed that the Forum had been well attended by parish councillors and a number of questions and issues had been raised with the representative speakers.

RESOLVED:

To note the update.

4. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PLAN

The AVS Officer reported that the Southern CEF had been asked to sponsor the Selby and Goole Community Pride Awards - Volunteer of the Year Award with sponsorship costing £250. The sponsorship would include Southern CEF branding on the trophy and a member of the CEF would be invited along to the event held in November at Drax Sport and Social Club.

The Partnership Board agreed to sponsor the Award.

The AVS Officer provided the Board with an update on the following priorities of the Southern Community Development Plan (CDP):

Loneliness and Isolation

The Partnership Board considered the projects detailed in the CDP.

The AVS Officer informed Board Members that over 200 patients had now been assessed through the Social Prescribing Service. Follow up impact assessments had also been carried out and the assessments had indicated that the Service had had a positive impact in respect of eight of the measuring indicators. It was noted that the Service would be finishing at the end of April 2016.

Youth Provision

Board members were informed that Lesley Senior from Bee Able had submitted a proposal to provide four youth activity events across a number of locations in the Southern CEF area. Events would include a mobile cinema, interactive talks from the Police, Fire Service, and St. Johns Ambulance, magic shows and circus skills.

The proposal also included costs to provide community transport. Board members felt that given there had been little take up of this provision at previous events it would not be cost effective to provide transport.

The estimated cost of providing four youth activity days was £1590.00.

The AVS Officer suggested that to promote the event flyers could be distributed to all households in the following areas: Hambleton, Drax, Hensall, Eggborough, Whitley, Beal, Kellington, and Thorpe Willoughby.

The Partnership Board agreed to support the events.

Transport

The Chief Officer, Selby District AVS reported that there had been a significant decline in the use of the AVS community transport service. The Chief Officer informed Board members that following the Southern CEF Forum meeting held in December 2015, she had met with representatives from Age UK and Tadcaster Community Transport to discuss ways of promoting community transport, and encouraging more people to volunteer as drivers.

The Chief Officer advised that whilst it had been agreed at the meeting that joint working was beneficial in some areas, each organisation had agreed to focus efforts in their respective localities on retaining service provision.

The Partnership Board considered the proposal and agreed that the theme of the next Forum meeting would be 'Caring for Carers'. The AVS Officer was asked to invite representatives from the following organisations: Dementia Forward, Carers Count, Age UK and the Selby Social Prescribing Service.

1. OPEN SESSION

The open session had consultation tables from North Yorkshire County Council - Highways (NYCC), Community Officer - Selby District Council (SDC), Carers Count, Bee-Able, Dementia Forward, York Bike Libraries, Energy Doctor, Selby Parish Nurses, and North Yorkshire Police.

2. FORUM MEETING - CHAIRMAN'S WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced, Ian Mcniff – Inspector (North Yorkshire Police), Anne Gill and Alison Wimbles (Selby Parish Nurses), Amanda Stevens – Senior Dementia Support Advisor (Dementia Forward), Dawn Theaker – Service Manager (Carers Count), and Richard Gregory – Practice Manager, Social Prescribing Service.

3. FORUM FOCUS – CARERS COUNT

lan Mcniff (North Yorkshire Police) provided the Forum with an update in relation to crime statistics for the Selby area. He reported that overall crime in the Selby area was currently low, and there had been no violent or theft related crime recently reported. He invited attendees to approach him during the Forum with any queries or questions.

The Forum speakers introduced themselves and outlined the services their organisations provided in relation to carers.

Anne Gill (Selby Parish Nurses) explained she and her colleague Alison Wimbles were registered nurses and had set up a service offering healthcare support to people of all ages. Anne explained that they visited people in their homes and held a drop-in session at King's Church, Selby very Wednesday 9 a.m. -12 p.m.

Richard Gregory (Social Prescribing Service) reported that in May 2015 Selby District Association of Voluntary Service (AVS) had launched a Selby District Social Prescribing Service for a twelve month trial, working in partnership with the Selby District GP Consortia, SHIELD. The Social Prescribing Service aimed to link patients with non-medical sources of support from a wide range of services delivered by voluntary and community sector organisations across the District. Referrals to the Social Prescribing Service came from all surgery GPs across Selby District on behalf of patients who they felt would benefit from support from a community based service. Once referred, a home visit was arranged to undertake an assessment of the patient with the aim of referring them to appropriate community based services, these included exercise classes, Yorkshire Energy Doctor, art groups and friendship matching people with others in a similar situation to themselves. Richard Gregory explained that due to a lack of funding the service would end in September 2016; the cost of running the service was approximately £50,000 per annum.

Anne Stevens (Dementia Forward) explained that Dementia Forward supported people living with dementia and those who cared for them. Dementia Forward provided avenues of support and information and a number of services including a dementia café, and a singing group to anyone who was interested in dementia.

Dawn Theaker (Service Manager, Carers Count) explained that the friendship service aimed to alleviate isolation and loneliness and to promote social interaction, independence, health, well-being and confidence through one-to-one support and group activities. Individuals requesting or referred to the service were then matched with others, based on shared interests, personality and location. The Forum was informed that the service would end in September 2016, due to a lack of funding; the cost of providing the service was currently £19,000 per annum.

The Chair encouraged attendees to visit the consultation tables and discuss any issues with the speakers.

The Chair thanked the public attendees and Forum speakers for attending the meeting.

The Chair closed the meeting at 8.00 p.m.

Introduction

Community Engagement Forums are a collaboration between a range of partners including the District Council, County Council, Town council, Parish Councils, Police, Fire and Rescue Service, local businesses and community groups along with individual residents.

This rural area comprises of the following parishes: Balne, Beal, Burn, Camblesforth, Carlton, Chapel Haddlesey, Criddling Stubbs, Drax, Eggborough, Gateforth, Heck, Hambleton, Hensall, Hirst Courtney, Kellington, Kirk Smeaton, Little Smeaton, Long Drax, Newland, Stapleton, Temple Hirst, Thorpe Willoughby, Walden Stubbs, West Haddlesey, Whitley and Womersley

Partnership Board Work

Three main themes emerged from our consultation for the new Community Engagement Plan;

- Youth Service Provision
- Addressing Loneliness and Isolation
- Increasing access to community transport for local residents

Over the past year these areas have been focused on and the following actions and work have been carried out:

Youth Provision

In partnership with Bee Able we developed a Youth event, which enabled us to consult with youth providers and young people from across the Southern CEF area. Our interactive workshop enabled the children and youth leaders to share their issues, develop ideas and work up an appropriately structured event for each half term holiday. At the event children and young people were encouraged to design the activity, how it will be promoted and to develop a budget.

The event was attended by 11 young people and 14 adults, including representatives from Wigan Leisure and Culture Trust (WLCT), Stronger Communities, North Yorkshire Youth, North Yorkshire Police and Southern CEF Partnership Board members.

Following the event planning meetings have been held to develop a series of youth events across the Southern CEF area. These events will take place in different locations and include activities, workshops, games and will be free.

Loneliness and Isolation

The Southern CEF is aware of the problems that face local people on a day to day basis, which result in loneliness and isolation, particularly in rural areas. Long term this can affect the health of people for many reasons.

The AVS led Social Prescribing Service, funded by SHIELD GP Consortia commenced at the beginning of May and was designed to create a Community data base, to be used as part of a service for GP's to refer people into local facilities. So far this has been a very successful project, receiving several referrals each month. Patient are visited by a member of the team to assess their support needs, make recommendations and / or referrals to beneficial services.

At the June Public Forum, the focus was on addressing Loneliness and Isolation.

Local Transport

Community Transport is becoming a popular alternative, but relies on new volunteers coming forward and the Southern CEF is actively supporting this. The Southern CEF Forum, held in December, focused on transport issues. At the event, Age UK, Selby District AVS and Tadcaster Community Transport agreed to meet to look at ways of promoting community transport and encouraging more people to volunteer as drivers.

A survey was circulated to all CEF board members regarding Concessionary Fare Schemes and the transport needs of older people, to help identify where the main issues and concerns lay.

The Southern CEF have aimed to provide as much information to the general public this year, regarding transport. Members of the public were given the opportunity to find out more fully the details of the proposed Bus Subsidy Reductions in the area as well as hearing from a guest speaker on the temporary closure of the bridge on the A645 over the River Aire.

Community Safety

In partnership with the Western CEF a vehicle was purchased for North Yorkshire Police volunteers to use to address rural crime issues. The vehicle has been a great asset to the community assisting with a number of operations.

Public Forums

During the year 4 public events have been held providing the opportunities for local residents to find out more about local initiatives. At each forum we have a "Market Place" area with stalls staffed by North Yorkshire Police, Highways, Selby District Council and Community organisations. This provides a wonderful opportunity for residents to discuss the issues that affect them with the appropriate organisation. Topics this year have included;

Tackling Loneliness and Isolation

A tea dance commenced the event, with a tutor available to assist. This was followed by speakers including, Emily Havercroft, Selby District Vision; Heather Kennedy, WLCT; Linda Slough, Selby District AVS; together they provided practical information on new services available and how to access them.

Youth Consultation

This event gathered evidence on future activities for young people in the area which the CEF has now developed an implementation plan.

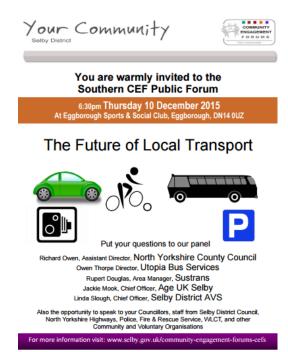
Addressing Your Transport Needs

John Laking, Policy Development Manager, (Integrated Passenger Transport, NYCC), Rupert Douglas, Area Manager, (Sustrans), Jackie Mook, Chief Officer (Age UK Selby), Linda Slough, (AVS, Selby District) and Katrina Talbot, (Tadcaster Volunteer Car Service Association) took part in a panel discussion regarding how to address local transport issues.

At this meeting the three Community Transport providers agreed to meet to explore their needs in terms of increasing awareness of their service and the recruitment of more volunteer drivers so that their overall reach can be increased.

Flooding

Following reports of struggles in the areas during the flooding this year, Southern CEF decided to run a flooding workshop, inviting key representatives from local flood strategy organisations to attend and offer advice and information.



Speakers included Robin Derry and Wendy Muldoon, (Emergency Planning at NYCC), Paul Jones (Shire Group of Internal Drainage Boards), and Wayne Palmer (Lead Officer – Environmental Health, Selby District Council).

All Parish Councils were invited to the event and following the initial panel discussion were able to speak to all of the speakers to develop their own emergency strategy.

Grants Awarded

Through the year the CEF Partnership Board has considered and awarded a range of grants to local initiatives that enhance the work of their Community Development Plan. This year a total of £10,379 has been awarded

GaTEWAY North Yorkshire is an accommodation and health promotion related support service for Gypsies, Roma, Travellers and Showpeople (GRTS) across North Yorkshire.

Our support is short-term. It can range from very brief involvement up to a maximum of two years. We provide informal support through our Drop-Ins and One-Off Outreach Appointments, as well as Welfare Needs Assessments, through to more formalised structured support, usually lasting up to six months, but no longer than two years

GaTEWAY NY also provides a range of involvement and participation opportunities and activities for GRTS. In addition, we deliver cultural awareness raising training to stakeholders and the wider community, as well as hosting Local Liaison Groups aimed at improving access and engagement for GRTS communities.

GaTEWAY NY is jointly commissioned by the Supporting People Partnership of North Yorkshire.

Our main aim is to support Gypsies, Roma, Travellers and Showpeople to maintain their cultural identity, to develop the skills and confidence necessary to allow them to live independently and achieve positive outcomes.

Horton Housing's GaTEWAY North Yorkshire service have successfully ran a GRT celebration of GRT History Month over the last three years. This year the aims of the project are to engage different generations of the Gypsy Roma Traveller community, extend the knowledge and understanding of the Gypsy Roma Traveller culture and promote understanding and value of cultural diversity and commonality. Furthermore by basing some of the work within the community, the accessibility for the community has been increased.

Our focus will be on 'food' and a celebration of the GRT cultures and traditions around cooking and recipes. We would like to create a GRT Recipe Book, which will be printed and launched in June, which is annual GRT History Month. Richard O 'Neill is a Gypsy playwright and author with national recognition. Richard will visit the two Local Authority Gypsy & Traveller Sites in the Selby District at Burn and Carlton, and discuss food and cooking with the residents. Their stories and recipes will be recorded, through photographs and scribes to ensure inclusivity. This element of the project will be the front part of the book. Richard will then visit the Selby MEA Hub School and introduce the project to the children by telling a traditional story and demonstrating the traditional cooking equipment. The children will enter a competition to design a family stew which reflects their own background. Richard will choose a winning entry from each class, and this will form the second half of the book.

The Recipe Book will be launched in the local Libraries, and will remain there as a legacy.

The project links directly to the Selby Equalities Network, whose aims are to promote equality and diversity in the District, and prevent Hate Crime, which has a direct link to a lack of awareness and understanding.

There have been particular issues of discrimination in the Southern CEF area, in particular arising from planning proposals and opposition over the last couple of years, but which has been very harmful to the wellbeing of the community. GRTS community members want the opportunity, in a supported way, to highlight the positive aspects of their culture, and also highlight some commonality with the settled community, and collectively came up with the idea of "food" as a way in which to do this. The very nature of the project is 'involvement', with the final product of the Recipe Book, the sole creation of those involved in the project. It will include testimonies, recipes, and photos of/from those directly involved in the project.

We hope that those more heavily involved in the project will go on to continue to be involved in engagement activities with GaTEWAY NY, and potentially take on voluntary roles within the scheme, which will support further similar activities in the future.

As part of ongoing work with GRT across the District, it is well proven that practical activities involving food and craft improve engagement of this hard to reach community. We have discussed ideas for the celebration of this years' GRT History Month with the community, and this was the most popular idea. Members of the community, from all generations, are keen to be involved, and to promote their culture in this way.

The purpose of the meeting is to work together to support families and schools to improve attendance, engagement, inclusion, welfare and attainment for Gypsy Roma Traveller (GRT) pupils in North Yorkshire. This project will engage directly with GRT pupils, and offer a unique opportunity for their culture to be celebrated, and for the commonality of 'food' to offer inclusion.

The idea for the project was discussed at the March meeting of the Selby District Equality Network meeting attended by a range of voluntary and community organisations, the Police, NYCC and SDC who all agreed it was a unique idea to promote and encourage community integration. The Equality Network have identified GRT communities as one of their 4 priorities for focus and partnership work as they recognise there is a great deal of work to be done in this area to challenge prejudice, misunderstanding and improved relationships.

In the center of the village of West Haddlesey, to the east of the playpark (on the north side of Main Street) and the pub (on the south side of Main Street) and to the west of the cluster of houses historically known as "Middle Haddlesey" there is a stretch of open road around 150 metres in length.

On the north side of this road there is a verge, approximately 4 feet wide, then a footpath, approximately 4 feet wide, then another, wider, grassed area with mature trees. A screenshot showing Google Street View from the playpark looking east is attached for ease of reference, along with a satellite view - on both, the proposed location of the fencing has been marked with a red line.

Our project is the installation of low-level (3ft high) "birdsmouth" fencing on the boundary of the grass verge next to the road. We are looking to undertake this project for a number of reasons.

Historically, as it's open countryside, this section of road was 60mph - although it's been 30mph for some time now, there is still a tendency on the part of drivers to speed up when they reach it. Given the make-up of the users of the footpath (see Q2.5), having the fence there provides a line of demarcation between the road and the footpath, keeping children from running into the road, and serving as a visual reminder to drivers that this is still a village environment despite the lack of houses on either side of the road.

As the village still has a number of working farms, there are large numbers of tractor movements and the verge is continually chopped up by tractors (and other vehicles) encroaching on to it - a screenshot is attached to demonstrate this. The presence of a fence would serve to discourage this, further helping in our efforts to improve the overall look of the village.

Permission has been received from North Yorkshire Highways for the fencing, subject to certain conditions, all of which would be met.

In all honesty, directly, it will struggle to meet any one specific objective. Indirectly, however, when looked at in the context of the wider aims which we have for the village, it will continue to bring the community together, encouraging residents to work together to improve the village and then look towards targets such as Britain in Bloom and the Best Kept Village competition.

Our annual village tidy-up day, held in late October, brought forward 5 volunteers the first year we ran it. The second year it brought forward 10. Last year it brought forward 15. On their own they're not huge numbers, but that represents around 15% of the residents of the village. We wish to continue building on this - at our most recent parish meeting we identified further areas of the village which would benefit from amelioration and we are looking at the best ways to do this on a limited budget, allocating the time in our next village tidy-up day to tackle them. It's small steps, but we remain committed to taking them.

We believe that the main direct beneficiaries are users of the footpath who are, on the whole, parents their small children walking to and from the village school in Chapel Haddlesey, and the playpark at the western end of village, visitors to the village, those on longer-scale walks, and dog walkers.

As part of the on-going amelioration of the village, though, combined with the planting work that has been undertaken (see Q2.6) and further plans for village improvement which we have, the work should benefit the village as a whole, as it serves to make the village a more attractive place to visit and live, as well as the wider community.

This project has stemmed from the request of a number of members of the community itself, and is part of a wider on-going project to improve the look of the village.

At the requests of villagers we have planted bulbs along both the north and south sides of Main Street between the trees, which have been well received. Also as a response to a direct request from villagers we have arranged leave a strip of land on the wider grassed area uncut, and sowed it with wildflowers, to create a mini-meadow. We have also arranged the cutting back of overgrowth along the footpath to keep it clean - all this was done late last year by volunteers from within the village community.

Historically the village has entered into the Britain in Bloom and Best Kept Village awards, but in recent years that has fallen by the wayside. We believe that the works which we have undertaken, and which we are looking to undertake, would act as a good springboard towards bringing the village together and getting it behind new entries into such competitions.

This type of fencing is priced on a per metre basis - we have sought a number of estimates all of which are in the region of £20 / m exclusive of VAT - at 150m in length this comes out at £3,600.00.

At the end of the day, we are a small village - our total income in 2015 / 2016 was just over £3,300.00, all of which was spent on necessities such as grass cutting, streetlighting repairs, electricity, playpark insurance and safety inspection, etc..

We run a very small sinking fund for one-off items, such as the recent refurbishment of the plapark (for the first time since it was constructed in 2000) which cost us around £1500.00. A further £300 was used last year for the bulbs and wildflowers. At the moment the sinking fund stands at around £800 - of which £200 is earmarked for repairs of play equipment and £200 earmarked for a replacement bench - and whilst we could apply the remainder towards this project, if we then received an unexpected bill (such as for the replacement of a streetlight) then we would have to go cap-in-hand to Selby District Council.

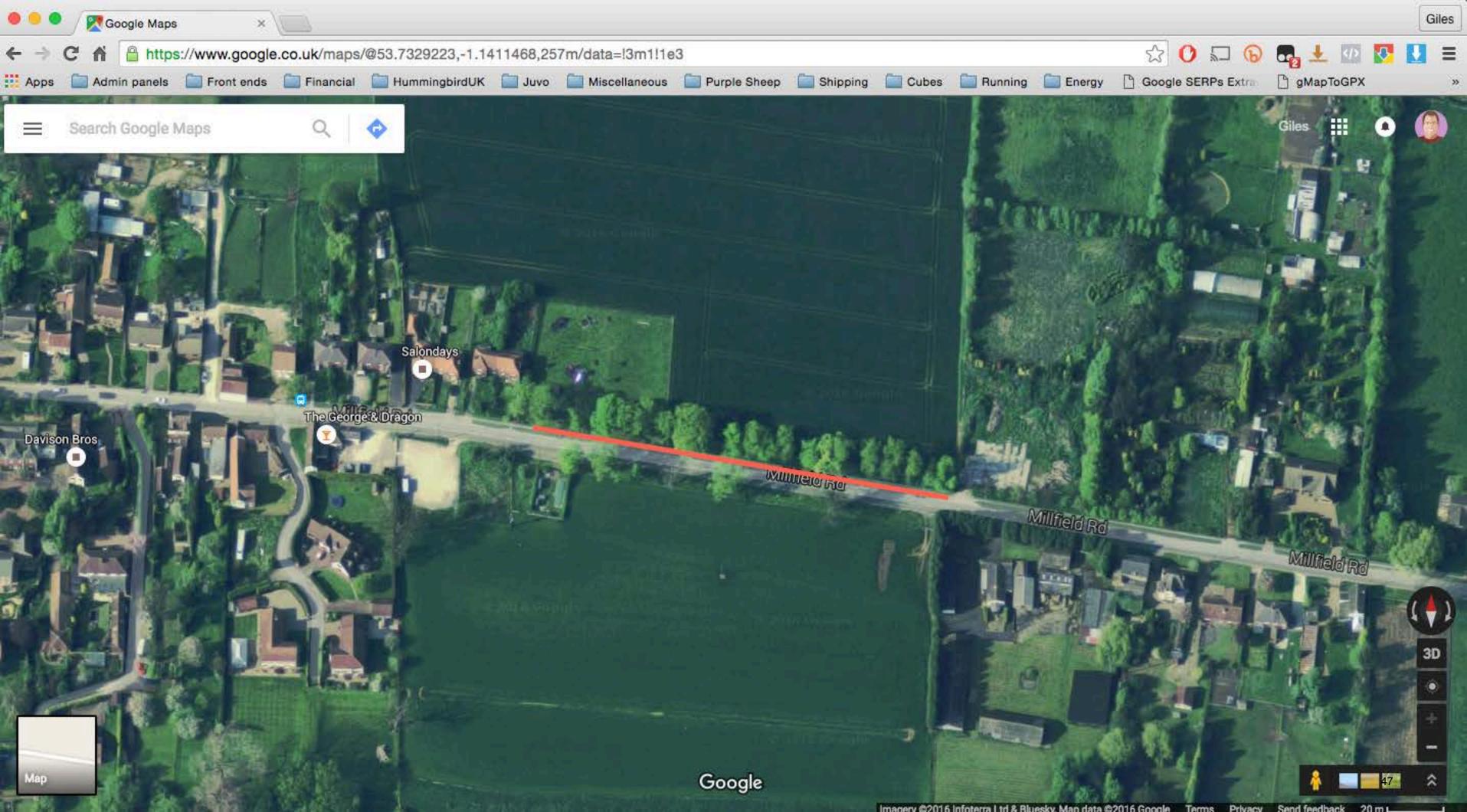

Name of the Committee

• The Committee shall be known as The Committee of Management of Cridling Stubbs Village Hall.

Terms of Reference

- The Committee shall be the means by which Cridling Stubbs Village Hall shall be held upon trust for the use of the inhabitants of Cridling Stubbs and the neighbourhood (the area of benefit) for meetings, lectures, classes and other forms of recreation and leisure time.
- To uphold the rules and regulations of the Village Hall.
- To make and alter the rules and regulations of the Village Hall, within the limits prescribed by the Deed.
- To apply any net income to the maintenance, insurance and any other expenses incurred by the use of property for the purposes specified in the Deed.

Membership of the Committee

- Members shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, to be held in April of every year. All inhabitants of the area of benefit aged 18 or above shall be entitled to attend and vote at the Annual General Meeting.
- The Committee shall consist of no more than nine members.
- The Committee may co-opt no more than three members to hold office until the end of the Annual General Meeting following their co-option.
- Appointment to the Committee shall be for a period of 12 months.
- The proceedings of the Committee shall not be invalidated by any failure to appoint or any defect in the appointment election or qualification of any member.
- No person shall be entitled to act as a Member of the Committee until after signing in the minute book of the Committee a declaration of acceptance and of willingness to act in the trusts of the Deed.
- Any competent member of the Committee may be re-appointed or re-elected.

Appointment of Officers

- Members shall appoint the following officers to the Committee at their first meeting in each year after the Annual General Meeting.
 - 1. Chairperson
 - 2. Vice-Chairperson (if thought necessary)
 - 3. Treasurer
 - 4. Secretary
 - 5. Any such officer the members consider necessary.
- Appointments shall be made at the Committee's Annual General Meeting and shall be for a period of 12 months only.

Meetings

- The Committee shall hold at least two ordinary meetings in each year.
- A quorum is to be one third of the total number of members existing at that time.
- A special meeting may be summoned at any time by the Chairperson or any two Members upon seven clear days notice being given to all other Members of the matters to be discussed.
- Every matter shall be determined by the voting of the majority of members present. If the number of votes cast are equal, the Chairperson shall have a second or casting vote.
- Minutes shall be taken of all meetings.

As the weeks passed it was evident that they were beginning to succeed. They have been successful in obtaining two grants so far – one has enabled the complete re-wiring of the building and the second will allow the installation of much-needed central heating.

The fabric of the building is slowly being improved thanks to these grants and a team of volunteers is supplementing the work with minor improvements and decorating. During one weekend of frantic activity the false ceiling was stripped out to reveal the original vaulted ceiling. That weekend invigorated and enthused the whole committee and imaginations started to work overtime!

There is much still to do. The windows are single glazed with rotting frames, the front porch needs guttering and fascias replacing and the door repairing.

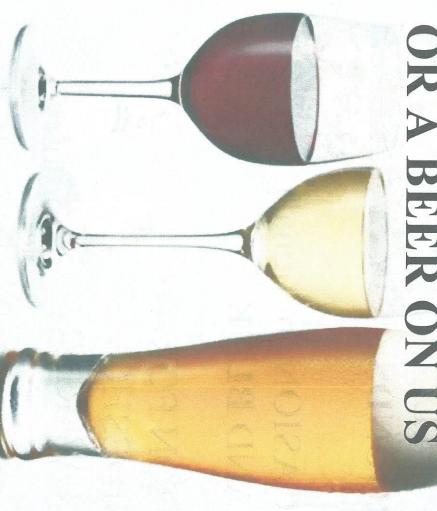

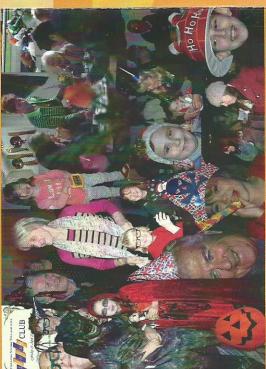
